## And now, for the critical test: How to keep chips out of the dip

Right up there on the list of Very Annoying Things are chips that break off in the dip. After all, who wants to fish through a bowl of clam or onion dip to retrieve the soggy remnants?

So we did a separate rating on our chips. Of course, taste and texture are two important considerations (see box on this page). But how do these 12 super-crunchy brands of chips hold up under a generous glob of onion dip? That's the real test.

The winner in the "dipability" category: Frito-Lay's Crunch Tators. They led the pack with a 9.3 (on a scale of 1 to 10).

"This sucker is strong," declared Bob Lee as he chomped into a Crunch Tator.

All of the super-crunchy kettle chips were given high scores in this category. In fact, none scored lower than a 7.2.

Here's how they stacked up: Bob's Texas Style, 8.6; Borden Krunchers, 8.6; Cape Cod, 8.5; The Maui Chips, 8.5; Country Made, 8.3; Home-Town, 8.1; Eagle Snacks Hawaiian Kettle, 8.1; Eagle Snacks Idaho Russet, 8.1; Grandma Utz, 8.0; Zapp's, 7.8; Arizona Select, 7.2.

said Cavins of Grandma Utz.

But in the end neither the names of the potatoes nor what they were cooked in altered that one basic truth: You can't eat just one.

Cood potato flavor, but a little too strong. Too greasy and a bit too much salt.

Zapp's Cost: 7 oz./\$1.39 Very bland; almost no potato taste. Almost too crisp and much too greasy.
